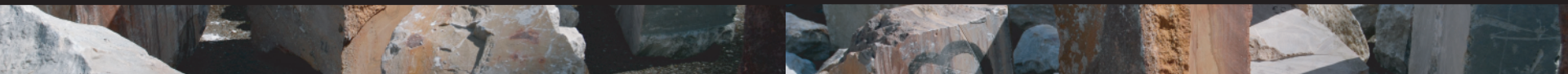

24th Annual International Stone Carving Symposium July 9th - 17th

at Camp Brotherhood Arlington, Washington

We invite you to join us at Camp Brotherhood for eight days of playing with stone, communing with nature and fun with old friends and new. All meals are provided and no household chores – now that is freedom! Each year this pastoral venue (complete with emus, alpacas and a donkey) is transformed into a field of tents with smiling people covered in stone dust. And if the day turns unbearably hot, the swimming pool is a right there waiting.

Instructors are available for everyone from beginner to expert, and sharing ideas and advice is something we always do.

There are slide shows, informational talks, and wonderful campfires in the evenings. And rumor has it that there is a Salon of well-known artists being created for our learning and sharing pleasure. Our Auction to raise funds for education is a night of hilarious fun, second only to our last night party. We also have an open to the public sculpture walk on the weekend.

Bring yourself, your creative energy, your humor, your tools and a favorite piece of stone. If you don't have stone or tools you can buy them from our helpful vendors. If you have not yet had the pleasure of a time spent at Camp B it could be time to treat yourself. Scholarships and work-study plans are available on a first come first served basis.

Tuition Includes: instruction, workshops, mentoring, meals and accommodations. Upon pre-registration you will receive a package of information, including directions to Camp Brotherhood and a list of things to bring. Check in begins on Saturday, July 9th and dinner will be the first meal served.

Accommodations: You choose; it is a matter of individual preference as the amenities are varied. The Camp has lodges, which provide motel style rooms accommodating 2-3 individuals with a bathroom in each room. If you prefer, private cottages may be available at an additional cost, but only if our reserved lodges are full. If you'd like to commune more closely with nature, space is provided for pitching a tent.

Scholarship Auction: Thursday, July 14th. It's a very, very fun event for a very, very good cause. The auction supports our education goals by funding work-study and scholarship positions for new and emerging artists. Bring something to donate, we'll buy anything and have a great time doing it.

Mentors: Most of our members have years of experience and work with various types of stone. If you desire individualized guidance or support, be sure to fill in the appropriate boxes on the registration form and we will connect you with a mentor. Both parties gain from the experience.

Sculpture Show on the Meadow: On Saturday, July 16th, we set up our outdoor art gallery. It is a great opportunity to show your work in a supportive and appreciative environment. We encourage everyone (experienced and beginners) to bring your finished piece of work to display. Invite your friends and clients to come. Some pedestals are provided, but bring your own if you can. A 30% sales commission supports NWSSA. All sales subject to Washington sales tax.

Workshops and Instructors:

Matt Auvinen -Guest Artist "Reproducing Your Work"~ Matt will be offering comprehensive workshops on mold-making, reproductions, pointing and direct carving methods. Matt has been carving for over 30 years. He received his BA from California State University, Chico and his MFA from Bowling Green State University in Ohio. In 1988, Matt moved to Pietrasanta where he worked as an artisan for several sculpture laboratories. For 12 of his 20 years in Italy, Matt taught sculpture and drawing for a private, university level art program in Florence. His sculptural foundation is from working with mixed media. Matt has worked with stone, cast bronze, welded steel, plaster and wood. Found object assemblage became a focus of his work in the late 80's and this sensibility has been projected on to his work in stone. In 2001, Matt curated an exhibition on stone carving techniques in Settignano, the town famous for its stoneworkers just above Florence. In 2002, he translated Francesco Carradori's Elementary Instructions for Students of Sculpture into English (Getty Publications).

Ruth Mueseler -"Beginning Stone Carving"~ Self taught, her art runs the gamut from the tiny to monumental, from humor to eulogy. As an instructor, Ruth is thoughtful in her manner and respectful of those wanting to learn stone. She will teach you about the stone and the tools and how to use them. She comes highly recommended by her former students.

Tamara Buchanan -"Beginning Stone Carving"~ Tamara has been sculpting stone for 25 years. Featured in many shows throughout the West, her work has won several awards. She loves sharing the process of carving stone and has been teaching at her studio on Lopez Island for 10 years.

Arliss Newcomb -"Basing, Pinning, & Sleeving"~ A wood carver for 25 years, met a stone sculptor in 1988 who gave her a first piece of stone and she hasn't carved wood since. Since joining NWSSA in 1990, she has traveled to workshops around the world, learning from some of the best. She shares her extensive knowledge leading this workshop.

Tom Urban, M.F.A. -"Tool Talks"~ Tom is a retired Associate Professor from the University of Oregon and the founding director of the EMU Craft Center. He is a long-standing member of the NWSSA and has been the Director of Silver Falls Symposium for a number of years. He has a massively extensive selection of tools and knows how to use them.

Richard Hestekind -"Strapping/Lifting Large Sculpture"~ Richard has been an active member of NWSSA for over 20 years. He creates monumental water features/sculpture and has considerable experience with moving and installing large pieces.

Scott Hackney -"Strapping/Lifting Large Sculpture"~ Scott is the co-owner of Marenakos Rock Center (Preston, WA). If you are ever installing large sculpture or a landscape feature, this is the guy you want on your team.
